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Pilgrims of Hope

We will journey through Lent 2025 in the Jubilee Year. Our Lenten journey this year therefore picks up on the Jubilee theme "Pilgrims of Hope". The letter issued by Pope Francis on the Feast of the Ascension 2024 to help us begin this pilgrimage is *Spes non Confundit*, hope does not disappoint. Hope does not disappoint, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Rom 5:1-2.5)

For this reason, through Lent 2025, our Lent Retreat theme is the "fruits of the Spirit". We experience the fruits of the Spirit in consolation: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness and self-control. For Ignatius consolation was an increase in faith, hope and love. (SE 316). We are invited in the Exercises to revisit consolation often. For this reason, we have invited those involved in our Centres to contribute poems and artwork. We pray that in this Jubilee Year the fruits of the prayer of so many people will renew our hope.

We pray with Pope Francis that the Jubilee is a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the "door" (cf. Jn 10:7.9) of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as "our hope" (1 Tim 1:1).

Choose what speaks to you

Consider what attracts you most, which speaks to you - the picture, the reflection, the scripture passage?

Concentrate on the one element that most strikes you.

Ways of Praying

Over the next few pages we have a few different ways of praying - take some time to use some or all of these methods of praying. We hope that you have a fruitful retreat.



Review of the Day

We suggest this is done at the end of every day.

- Be still, remember God who loves you is present now.
- look back over the day. Ask God to shine a light into your heart
 - o so that looking back you may be able to see God at work.
- Pay attention to your emotions:
 - What brought you joy?
 - o Is there anything you feel unhappy about?
- Talk to God about your day:
 - For what do you feel most thankful?
 - Give thanks.
- For what do you feel least thankful?
 - Hand this over to God.
- What have you learned from the day?
- Look forward to tomorrow.
 - How might you make the best of the day?

Awareness Exercises

The following awareness Exercises can be used at the beginning of each prayer period to help you quieten down.



Mantra

A mantra, a repeated short phrase, can help us to settle down. Sometimes we think about the words, but mostly we let go of thinking and trust that simply saying the words is sufficient. We can repeat the words in time with our walking or breathing or to the rhythm of music. There are many suitable phrases such as,

'Come Lord Jesus', 'The Lord is compassion and love' etc.

One of the most famous mantras is 'The Jesus Prayer':

'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, Have mercy on me, a sinner'.

Awareness of Sounds



Listen to the sounds you can hear around you.

If you are indoors, allow yourself to notice sounds inside and outside the room. Identify each sound as you are able. Don't stay with any one sound. Gently, slowly, without judging sounds as good or bad, focus your attention on each one then move on.

If a sudden sound or distraction occurs, acknowledge it and name it. *Don't try to ignore it.*

When you are ready, become aware of the sound of your own breathing. Through the sounds, be attentive to the invitation of God, who dwells in creation.

Awareness of your body

Beginning at the top of your head and passing down through the body to the feet be attentive to each part of the body in turn.

Gently focus in turn on each part ... head ... face ... eyes ...neck ... shoulders etc.

For each part, allow a few moments to become aware of what is being felt, without making judgement upon it.

Feel temperature, clothing, moving air, tension, pain, tingling etc.

Move on in turn until you have given attention to your whole body.

Then consider your whole self you as a person made in God's likeness ... you in whom God chooses to dwell.

Walking

Walk slowly with awareness of whatever comes to you: the surroundings, thoughts, feelings, how your body is. It usually helps to walk more slowly than usual and to pay attention to what is around you.

Praying with Pictures



Each day during this retreat we provide a picture to ponder which in some way links to the person we feature. If you would like to use pictures to stimulate your prayer, then we suggest you:

- Settle down quietly into a comfortable yet attentive position. Wherever you are, you are in the presence of God, acknowledge this.
- Offer yourself, your time and your imagination to God.
- Ask God for what you need today, what you desire.

This could be for a greater love of Jesus, in words such as: Jesus, may I know you clearly, love you more dearly and follow you more nearly.

- Ask God to inspire you and let the picture reveal what God wants you to see.
- What do you feel overall about the picture. Do you like it or dislike it?
 You may appreciate the colours, the mood, the composition.
- Pay careful attention to the picture. If there are people in it, see how they relate to each other. How do you imagine the people are feeling? Are there significant signs or symbols in the picture?
- Spend some time just contemplating the picture.
- What does the picture say to you?
 - Does it challenge you in any way?
 - Does it introduce you to a new way of seeing things?
 - Perhaps you don't like the way the artist or photographer sees things and you imagine things very differently.
- You may want to talk to God about the picture, or about something in your life that the picture has evoked. You may want an imaginary conversation with one or more of the characters in the picture.
- Finish with a formal prayer such as the Lord's Prayer/Our Father.

Praying with Scripture

You may like to ponder in the 'Lectio Divina' style, or where there is a Gospel story you might like to imagine you are one of the characters in the scene - Imaginative Contemplation, also known as Ignatian Contemplation. If you are part of a prayer group then your group leader should give you some more guidance on both of these, but here are the basic outlines to get you started.

A Prayerful Pondering - Lectio Divina

This is suitable for use with psalms, wisdom literature and letters etc

- Read the passage slowly stopping wherever a word or phrase seems to say something. Let the words speak to you.
 - Let the passage touch your own life, your memories.
 - There is no one right meaning; the same passage will say very different things to different people.
- Meditate on the words. It often helps to say the words or phrases to yourself several times, ideally out loud. Ponder, ruminate!
- Speak to God in your own words.
 - Imagine God speaking back to you. Express your own deepest desires.
- Contemplate; be in silence with God. Be quiet and open before God. Rest. Let the mind be still. When your mind starts to wander then turn back to the passage and continue reading.

Allow this fourfold process to continue until the period of prayer is over.

Finish with a formal prayer such as the Lord's Prayer/Our Father.

Journaling

After your prayer it is good to jot down in a journal the subject of your prayer and what happened during the prayer, your feelings, thoughts etc. This will help you remember; particularly useful if you are sharing your prayer with a group or spiritual guide. Journaling will also help you notice patterns in your prayer.

Imaginative Contemplation

This is suitable for use with the gospels and other stories

The most frequent way of praying that Saint Ignatius uses in his book, The Spiritual Exercises, is that of imagining ourselves in a Gospel scene. We imagine ourselves as a character in the story. We take part in the story, seeing Jesus and all the other people, being aware of what's going on and how we are feeling. The purpose of praying with the imagination is to allow Christ in the Scripture to speak to us.

To bring the Gospel stories alive for us. We are not trying to recreate history.

It doesn't matter if our imagination takes the story off in a different direction to the Scripture. It doesn't matter if the story takes place in 1st century Palestine or where we live now in the 21st century. What is important is what God wants to say to us through this passage.

Post prayer reflection is important to draw out the implications.

- Choose a passage, read and familiarise yourself with the story.
- You are in the presence of God, acknowledge this.
- Offer yourself, your time and your imagination to God so that whatever you imagine will be inspired by God.
- Ask God for what gift or grace you need, what are your deepest desires.
 - This could be for a greater love of Jesus, in words such as: Jesus, may I know you clearly, love you more dearly and follow you more nearly.
- Set the scene from your scripture passage.
 - Take your time, see all that is around, hear, feel, taste and smell.
 What is the setting of the story in your imagination? You may imagine it in the present day, or 2000 years ago. You may be involved with people you know.
 - Become a character in the story...... Who are you?
 - You may be a central character or someone on the side-lines.
 - Let the scene unfold naturally. The story might depart from the Gospel scene and take on a life of its own; that's fine, trust God; everything human is appropriate material for prayer.
- Conversation (colloquy): When the story has finished talk in your own words to Jesus, God the Father, Mary or one of the characters in the story you have contemplated, imagine how they might reply.
- End the prayer with a formal prayer like the Lord's Prayer.

Trustfulness

Our first fruit of the Spirit is Trustfulness.

We begin this virtue by focusing on our trust in God.

We believe that we were made in the image of God and we trust that God wishes the best for us.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: That this retreat might bring me closer to God and enable me to live a virtuous life.

Setting: Today's Scripture is suitable for meditation in the style of Lectio Divina.

Titus 3: 3-8 NIVUK

At one time we too were foolish, disobedient, deceived and enslaved by all kinds of passions and pleasures. We lived in malice and envy, being hated and hating one another.

But when the kindness and love of God our Saviour appeared, he saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Saviour, so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life.

This is a trustworthy saying. And I want you to stress these things, so that those who have trusted in God may be careful to devote themselves to doing what is good.

These things are excellent and profitable for everyone.

Trustfulness

The books of wisdom, such as Proverbs give us encouragement to live a good life, which can generally be guaranteed to bring a sense of peace and satisfaction. Although living a good life will not mean that we never have to suffer, after all, sickness and death are bound to touch us, but at least our consciences will be clear.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To learn and follow the ways of God.

Setting: Today's Scripture from the book of Proverbs, promises God's favour on those who follow God's ways. We suggest that Lectio Divina is the best approach to this piece of Scripture.

Proverbs 3:5-6 & 29-35 NIVUK

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding;

in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

Do not plot harm against your neighbour, who lives trustfully near you.

Do not accuse anyone for no reason – when they have done you no harm.

Do not envy the violent or choose any of their ways.

For the Lord detests the perverse but takes the upright into his confidence.

The Lord's curse is on the house of the wicked, but he blesses the home of the righteous.

He mocks proud mockers but shows favour to the humble and oppressed.

The wise inherit honour, but fools get only shame.



Conversation: Talk to Jesus in your own words as a friend **Final Prayer**: End with a formal prayer such as the Lord's Prayer/Our Father.

Trustfulness

Today's Gospel passage from Luke follows the story of the unjust steward who upon hearing he is to be sacked, gets his master's debtors to reduce their debts and thus be grateful to him when he loses his job. Trustfulness works two ways. We need to trust in God, but also others need to be able to trust us.

Love of money is the root of all evil?

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: You may like to imagine Jesus saying these words to those who Luke says loved money. We suggest using Imaginative Contemplation for this passage

Luke 16: 10-15 NIVUK

Jesus said:

'Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else's property, who will give you property of your own?'

'No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money.'

The Pharisees, who loved money, heard all this and were sneering at Jesus.

He said to them, 'You are the ones who justify yourselves in the eyes of others, but God knows your hearts. What people value highly is detestable in God's sight.'

Trustfulness

Today's Scripture from Psalm 19 talks of both our hidden faults and willful sins. Our willful sins we are all to aware of and should try to avoid. We ask God to enlighten us and reveal to us our hidden faults, such as the times we hurt others without being aware of it, so that we can take steps to avoid these faults in the future.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: That I may trust in the Lord and his precepts and understand more my own sinful tendencies so that I may avoid them in the future.

Setting: Psalms are written to be sung but it can prove profitable to ponder their meaning in the Lectio Divina style of prayer. Allow yourself to ponder on your own attitude to God and your own behaviour.

Psalm 19: 7-14 NIVUK

The law of the Lord is perfect, refreshing the soul.

The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple.

The precepts of the Lord are right, giving joy to the heart.

The commands of the Lord are radiant, giving light to the eyes.

The fear of the Lord is pure, enduring forever.

The decrees of the Lord are firm, and all of them are righteous.

They are more precious than gold, than much pure gold; they are sweeter than honey, than honey from the honeycomb. By them your servant is warned; in keeping them there is great reward. But who can discern their own errors? Forgive my hidden faults. Keep your servant also from willful sins; may they not rule over me. Then I will be blameless, innocent of great transgression.

May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight, Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer.

Peace

What robs us of our peace?

We can spend our time worrying about possible problems.

We can be fearful of something in our life that we are trying to hide from others.

We can live with a troubled conscience.

Much of what robs us of our peace is of our own making. We worry and fret about so many things. Trust that all will be well. Be open, be honest, be fearless.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: This passage may be pondered in words or phrases - Lectio Divina. Or you might imagine you are being sent out by Jesus, either in our world today or even in Jesus' period. Your first words upon entering any house is 'shalom', peace. - Imaginative contemplation

Luke 10:1-7 NIVUK

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where he was about to go.

He told them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few.


Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.

Go! I am sending you out like lambs among wolves.

Do not take a purse or bag or sandals; and do not greet anyone on the road.

'When you enter a house, first say, "Peace to this house."

If someone who promotes peace is there, your peace will rest on them; if not, it will return to you.

Love your enemy - that's his radical new teaching to bring peace.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder using Lectio Divina.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder using Lectio Divina.

1 Kings 19:11-13 NRSVACE

Final Prayer: End with a formal prayer such as the Lord's Prayer/Our Father.

Peace

Love God, Father, Son and Spirit, Love neighbour, and Love self - three loves. If we can appreciate God's gifts, of God's self, God's gifts of our neighbours, family and friends, and God's gift of our own self, then we can live at peace.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To be given peace of heart and the grace to follow the teachings of Christ.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder using Lectio Divina.

John 14:23-27 NRSVACE

Jesus answered, 'Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me.

'I have said these things to you while I am still with you.

Peace

So often work for peace seems a fruitless task when men seem to prefer war and violence to solve differences. However, with great patience, peace-making often wins out when wars fail to bring the hoped for rapid results.

Let us pray today for peace in the world and that all those dedicated to negotiating for peace will, with patience, have success.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To pray for peace in the world

Setting: Scripture readings to ponder using Lectio Divina.

James 3: 17-18 NIV

But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere.

Peacemakers who sow in peace reap a harvest of righteousness.

Matthew 5:9 NIV

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Patience

Our Scripture reading today talks of endurance. Endurance, patience under suffering. James also makes it clear that temptations to do wrong don't come from God, but rather from our own evil desires. God's desire is that we do good.

We need to be aware of the actions of the Good Spirit and the bad spirit in our lives

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: Ask for the grace of discernment so that I may be clear what are God's desires for me.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder using Lectio Divina.

James 1:12-18 NRSVACE

Blessed is anyone who endures temptation. Such a one has stood the test and will receive the crown of life that the Lord has promised to those who love him. No one, when tempted, should say, 'I am being tempted by God'; for God cannot be tempted by evil and he himself tempts no one. But one is tempted by one's own desire, being lured and enticed by it; then, when that desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin, and that sin, when it is fully grown, gives birth to death. Do not be deceived, my beloved.

Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. In fulfilment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.



Patience

Conversation: Talk to Jesus in your own words as a friend

Final Prayer: End with a formal prayer such as the Lord's Prayer/Our

Father.

Patience

Though patience can be a great virtue, we have to be sure that we are waiting for the right thing. Today's Gospel reading shows us a man who has patiently waited for 38 years to be cured. He believed he could only be cured when the water was stirred up. Jesus comes and immediately cures him. No need to wait for the water to be stirred up.

Sometimes when we are waiting patiently and praying for something to happen, we should keep our eyes open, maybe God is offering us an answer that we are not expecting. For example the Catholic Church has been praying for more clergy to maintain the current system of parishes. God doesn't seem to be inspiring sufficient young men to follow this vocation. Could the answer to maintaining the Church lie in a totally different solution?

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: Do I have anything in my life I should like healing?

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder using Lectio Divina.

James 1:12-18 NRSVACE

Now in Jerusalem by the Sheep Gate there is a pool, called in Hebrew Bethzatha,

which has five porticoes. In these lay many invalids—blind, lame, and paralyzed.

One man was there who had been ill for thirty-eight years.


When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had been there a long time.

he said to him, "Do you want to be made well?"

The sick man answered him, "Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up; and while I am making my way, someone else steps down ahead of me."

Patience

The Scripture passage today tells of Jesus' temptations in the wilderness. 40 days alone in a barren place might seem a long time to spend in prayer and reflection; a long time to learn the ways of the good and bad spirit. But it takes time to reflect to allow ourselves to gain the wisdom of understanding how we are likely to be tempted to comfort, honour and pride. Jesus needs this space to recognise how he might be vulnerable to temptation.

If Jesus had the patience to spend time alone in prayer and reflection, how much more do we need that time and space?

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder using Lectio Divina.

Luke 4:1-13 NRSVACE

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone."

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him."



Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written,

"He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you", and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone."

Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test."

When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

When Saint Patrick returned to Ireland after having spent so many years there as a slave in his youth, he must have had a certain level of worry, but the desire to spread the Gospel and do God's work overcame any natural foreboding.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To be given the strength to do difficult things for God.

Setting: A Scripture reading to imagine using Imaginative Contemplation

In Damascus there was a disciple named Ananias. The Lord called to him in a vision, 'Ananias!'


'Yes, Lord,' he answered.

Kindness

This compassion always results in an act of kindness, today, the feeding of the 5,000. When did you last look at someone who evoked compassion in you? Did this result in an act of kindness?

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: A Scripture reading to imagine that you are with Jesus, the Apostles, the crowd on the side of Lake Galilee, who are you? We suggest using Imaginative Contemplation for this passage.

Mark 6:32-44 NIVUK

The Apostles and Jesus went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. But many who saw them leaving recognised them and ran on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So he began teaching them many things. By this time it was late in the day, so his disciples came to him. 'This is a remote place,' they said, 'and it's already very late. Send the people away so that they can go to the surrounding countryside and villages and buy themselves something to eat.'

But he answered, 'You give them something to eat.'
They said to him, 'That would take more than half a year's wages!
Are we to go and spend that much on bread and give it to them to eat?'
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They said to him, 'That would take more than half a year's wages! Are we to go and spend that much on bread and give it to them to eat?' 'How many loaves do you have?' he asked. 'Go and see.' When they found out, they said, 'Five – and two fish.' Then Jesus told them to make all the people sit down in groups on the green grass. So they sat down in groups of hundreds and fifties. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to his disciples to distribute to the people. He also divided the two fish among them all. They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces of bread and fish. The number of the men who had eaten was five thousand.

Joseph shows kindness to Mary to begin with by not accusing her of unfaithfulness but quietly putting her aside. Then, after his dream, he takes her as his wife.

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To be given the wisdom to recognise the word of God in my life.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder - Lectio Divina or imagine that you are Joseph or a friend that he is telling his story to - using Imaginative Contemplation.

Matthew 1:18-25 NIVUK


This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: his mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.'

All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had said through the prophet: 'The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel' (which means 'God with us').

When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife.

But he did not consummate their marriage until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the hour of prayer, at three o'clock in the afternoon. And a man lame from birth was being carried in. People would lay him daily at the gate of the temple called the Beautiful Gate so that he could ask for alms from those entering the temple.

When he saw Peter and John about to go into the temple, he asked them for alms.

Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. But the angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus.

Thus he has given us, through these things, his precious and very great promises, so that through them you may escape from the corruption that is in the world because of lust, and may become participants in the divine nature.

For this very reason, you must make every effort to support your faith with goodness, and goodness with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with endurance, and endurance with godliness, and godliness with mutual affection, and mutual affection with love. For if these things are yours and are increasing among you, they keep you from being ineffective and unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. For anyone who lacks these things is short-sighted and blind, and is forgetful of the cleansing of past sins.

Therefore, brothers and sisters, be all the more eager to confirm your call and election, for if you do this, you will never stumble. For in this way, entry into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ will be richly provided for you.

Self-Control

Self-Control is necessary to avoid the vices which greed, lust and selfishness might put in our way. As the book of Wisdom tells us in today's passage; wisdom "teaches us self-control, prudence, justice and courage".

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To become wise and learn what brings true happiness and have the self-control to avoid what tempts us to loose our integrity.

Matthew 26:47-56 NRSVACE

While Jesus was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; with him was a large crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the elders of the people.

Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying, 'The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him.'

At once he came up to Jesus and said, 'Greetings, Rabbi!' and kissed him. Jesus said to him, 'Friend, do what you are here to do.'

Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and arrested him.

Suddenly, one of those with Jesus put his hand on his sword, drew it, and struck the slave of the high priest, cutting off his ear.


Then Jesus said to him, 'Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword.

Self-Control

The early Church to which Titus is writing in today's Scripture passage was vulnerable to slanderous attacks. They were therefore very keen to ensure that they lived virtuous lives beyond reproach. An important virtue, repeated frequently in this passage is 'self-control'.

We might consider today how others would rate our way of life. Do we live an ordered and self-controlled way of life?

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To be given the grace to live with integrity in a loving way so all may see me as a follower of Christ.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder. We suggest using Lectio Divina.

Titus 2 NIVUK

You, however, must teach what is appropriate to sound doctrine. Teach the older men to be temperate, worthy of respect, self-controlled, and sound in faith, in love and in endurance.

Likewise, teach the older women to be reverent in the way they live, not to be slanderers or addicted to much wine, but to teach what is good. Then they can urge the younger women to love their husbands and children, to be self-controlled and pure, to be busy at home, to be kind, and to be subject to their husbands, so that no one will malign the word of God.

Similarly, encourage the young men to be self-controlled. In everything set them an example by doing what is good. In your teaching show integrity, seriousness and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned, so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us.

Joy

The joy which the Spirit grows in us – a pervasive sense of well-being - is not dependant on circumstances, but on God's presence and action in our own lives, or those of others. This action is often surprising. In our Scripture today Jesus is filled with joy because of the unexpected and surprising ways of God. God is a God of surprises.

What are some of the surprises of God you have experienced which have brought you joy?

You are invited to take some time today to recall these, perhaps writing them down, and to savour the joy which they bring, giving thanks to God for them, as Jesus did. Notice how you feel afterwards.

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: That you may be given the gift of joy.

Setting:In today's Scripture you might imagine Jesus welcoming his disciples back from their preaching exercise and rejoicing that the Kingdom of Heaven is near.

He will not cry out or shout or make his voice heard in the street. He will not break a bruised reed, nor will he snuff out a smouldering wick;

faithfully he will establish justice.

He will not falter or become discouraged until he has established justice upon the earth;

and the coastlands wait for his teaching.

Luke 2: 25-35 NIVUK

Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

"Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace.
For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel."

The child's father and mother marvelled at what was said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

Setting: A Scripture reading to imagine. See Jesus entering the city and the crowds praising him. We suggest using Imaginative Contemplation.

Matthew 21: 1-11 NRSVACE

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives,

Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me.

If anyone says anything to you, just say this,

"The Lord needs them." And he will send them immediately.

This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

'Tell the daughter of Zion,
Look, your king is coming to you,
humble, and mounted on a donkey,
and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.'

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. 1 John 4: 7-12 NCB

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God. Everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.

Scripture is a source of hope, as it allows us to experience the stories of God's trustworthiness throughout history. The Feast of Passover remembers God's covenant with his people. We prepare today to partake in the paschal mystery: the new covenant. What does covenant mean to you?

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To prepare our hearts and spirits for the renewed hope the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus brings.

Setting: A Scripture reading to ponder. We suggest using Imaginative Contemplation.

Matthew 26: 17-19 NIV

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, the disciples approached Jesus and said, "Where do you want us to prepare for you to eat the Passover?"

He said, "Go into the city to a certain man and tell him, 'The teacher says, "My appointed time draws near; in your house I shall celebrate the Passover with my disciples.""' The disciples then did as Jesus had ordered, and prepared the Passover.

Hope

During the Last Supper in Jerusalem, Jesus clearly predicts to his disciples his forthcoming suffering and death. Yet he leaves them with cause for hope in this new covenant, the taking of his body and blood in memory of him. Although he might be leaving this world in a straightforward bodily sense, he leaves his spirit and body for us all to take up his mission.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To appreciate more deeply the Eucharist which Christ left for us.

Setting: A Scripture reading to imagine that you are in that upper room with the disciples. We suggest using Imaginative Contemplation.

Luke 22:14-20 NIVUK

When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, 'I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer.

For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfilment in the kingdom of God.'

After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, 'Take this and divide it among you.

For I tell you I will not drink again from the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes.'

And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me.'

In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying,

'This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you.

Hope

Its difficult to see hope in the crucifixion of Christ. However, our hope lies not in all that human evil can do to the good person but rather in the bright promise of the Resurrection and new life.

Spend some time, perhaps in front of a cross or crucifix, pondering Jesus' suffering and thanking him for all the fruit that comes to you and awaits you through it.

Today's Prayer

Preparation: Begin by stilling; then dedicating the time of prayer to God and asking God that all you think, feel and imagine are for the glory of God.

Gift: Ask for what you desire. Suggestion: To know Jesus more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

Setting: A Scripture reading to join with those at the foot of the cross. We suggest using Imaginative Contemplation.

John 19:25-30 NRSVACE

Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene.

When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, 'Woman, here is your son.'

Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.'

And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

After this, when Jesus knew that all was now finished, he said (in order to fulfil the scripture),

'I am thirsty.'

A jar full of sour wine was standing there.

So they put a sponge full of the wine on a branch of hyssop and held it to his mouth.

When Jesus had received the wine, he said, 'It is finished.'

Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

"They have taken the Lord from the tomb,
and we don't know where they put him."
So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb.
They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter
and arrived at the tomb first;
he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in.
When Simon Peter arrived after him,

he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed.

For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.
